## THE BIBLE

Ephesians 1:4-12; Psalm 5

- How would you describe or explain the Bible to someone who was unfamiliar with it?
- No judgment, but how often do you read the Bible on your own?
- In one word, how would you describe the experience of reading the Bible on your own?
- What keeps you from reading the Bible more often?
- Has reading the Bible ever changed you or your perspective? What happened?
- Does anyone know any more passages of Scripture about God's love?
- Other than passages about God's love for us, what else can you find in the Bible?
- God wants us to know we are loved, but what else do you think He wants us to know as a result of reading the Bible?
- Read Psalm 5. The Bible is God's love letter to us, but sometimes it contains people's letters back to God. What would you say to God in a letter like this?
- One month from now, how would you like your relationship with the Bible to be different? This week, what's one think you can do to work toward that goal?
